

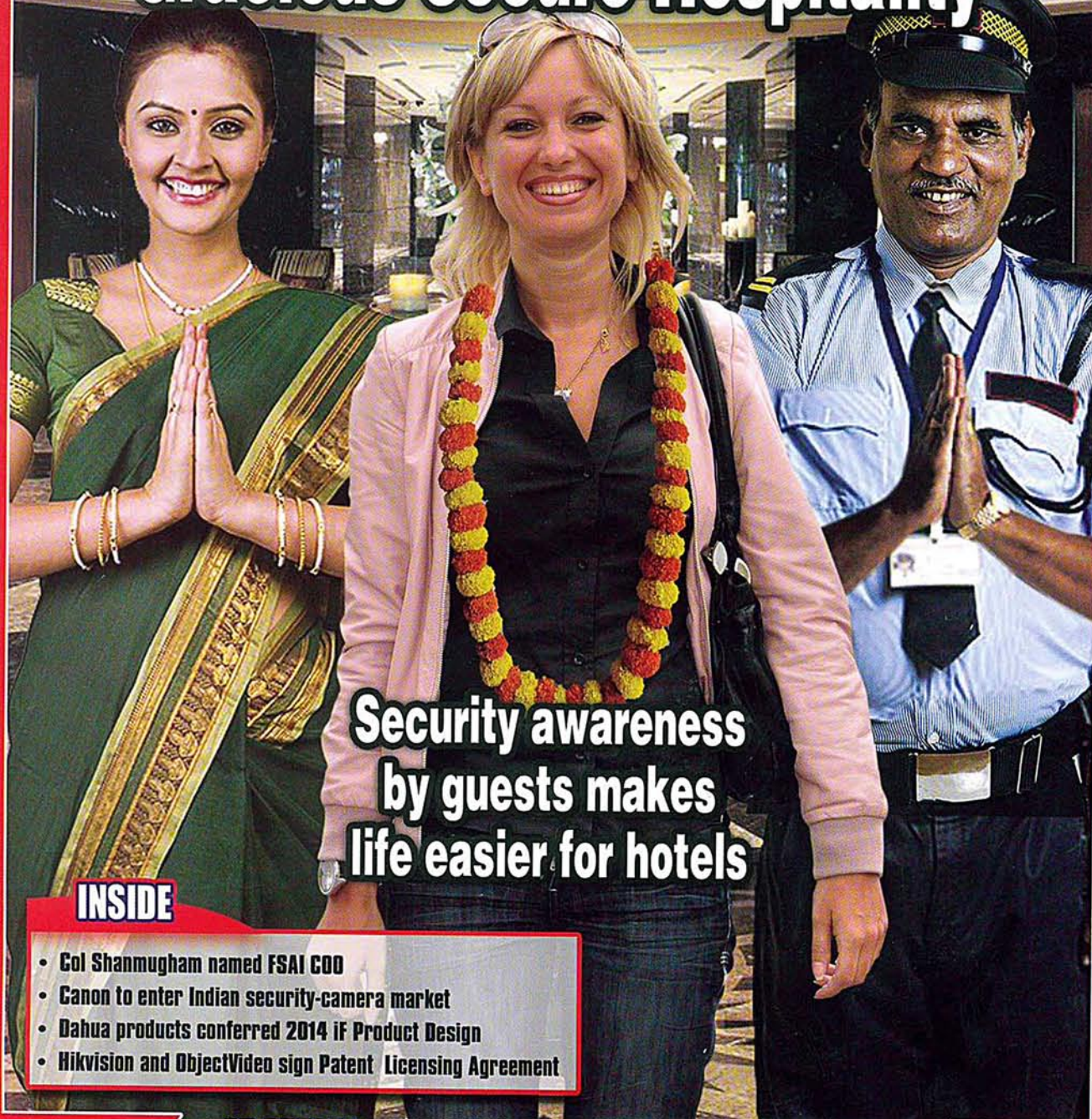

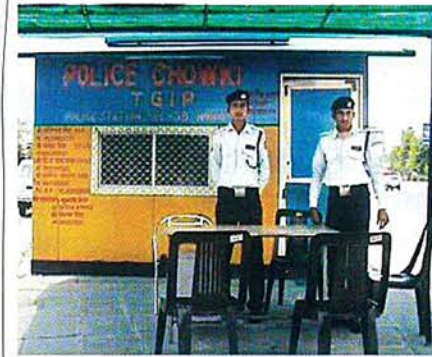

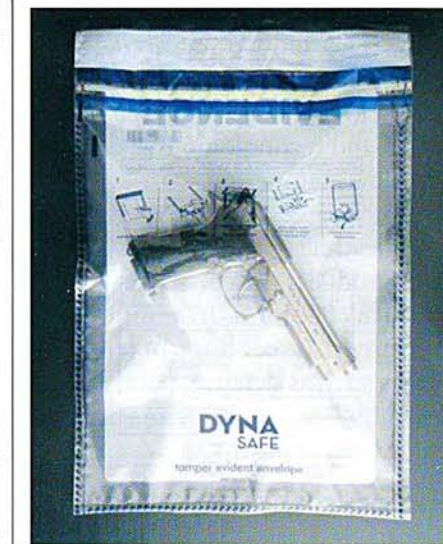


During his tenure as the NCC Group commander in Trichy he was instrumental in conducting

A breakthrough in evidence collection- Tamper Evident Envelopes/Bags from Dynaflex

What makes the product unique is the provision of bar-coding/sequential numbering helping to trace the contents and the chain of custody details printed on it, helping to keep the records intact.

It is however often observed that the law enforcement agencies use paper bags, cloth, ordinary plastic bags to collect the evidences from the crime scene. The reason is absence of awareness about scientific evidence collection bags and the lack of availability of collection bags which are of a global standard. As a result the evidential items which are of physical, chemical or biological nature get contaminated with other substances often resulting in great damage to the case.

The company is already in talks with Indian Agencies like CBI, Central Forensic Laboratory and states police across India for supplying these products.

Globally, not many companies manufacture high security tamper-evident bags and envelopes, which are used for evidence collection. Dynaflex happens to be one among them. The infrastructure required to assure the reliability is difficult in terms of machinery, standards, people and technology. In a country like India, tampering with evidence in chain of custody is a common sight leading to delay in justice; these products are a breakthrough in evidence collection.
