

Guj firm to make tampering with evidence difficult

Dynaflex In Talks With NIA To Sell Tamper-Proof Bags

Vadodara: If cases of tampering with evidence fall in years to come, a Gujarat-based company can claim the credit for it.

Dynaflex, a Halol-based firm that specializes in manufacturing security and tamper evident packaging products, is in talks with the National Investigation Agency (NIA), the premier investigating agency, regarding the use of tamper-proof bags. The firm is trying to convince NIA to go for these bags to protect vital evidences.

Dynaflex is Asia's largest manufacturer of security and tamper evident products and it is the only firm in the country to manufacture this product. "We have demonstrated our product to NIA officials and they seemed to be quite impressed with the tamper-proof bags. We have also approached the Mumbai and Gujarat police to endorse this product," said Gaurav Vo-

ra, director of Dynaflex.

According to the firm, a court ruling requires that only those evidences wrapped in cloth and sealed with wax will be admissible in the court. "We understand the rule and we are trying to convince the concerned authorities to modify them and adopt better technology. We are also in talks with the attorney general of Gujarat," Vora told TOI.

According to Vora, most of the western countries and some Asian countries have already started using such tamper proof bags for protecting evidences. "We are already exporting the bags to UAE and Ireland and eyeing more countries for export. The Indian police should start using these bags that have been manufactured after lot of research and investment," he added.

The Rs 26-crore company is exporting its security packaging products to over 45 nations and it is planning to invest about Rs 15 crore in its existing plant at Halol to increase the production from 75 million pieces to 300 million pieces annually. The company is targeting a turnover of Rs 75 crore in the next three years. "We are already supplying tamper-proof bags to passport offices in five states and education boards in four states," said Niranjan Vora, chairman and managing director of Dynaflex.
